WHAT IS MFP?

- The ASA Minority Fellowship Program (MFP) has existed since 1974 and has supported nearly 500 sociologists of color during this time span.
- For the 2011-12 MFP Fellowship award year, MFP is supported by significant annual contributions from Sociologists for Women in Society, Alpha Kappa Delta, and the Midwest Sociological Society, along with the Association of Black Sociologists, the Southwestern Sociological Association, and numerous individual ASA members.

WHO CAN APPLY?

- Applicants can be new or continuing graduate students of sociology, who are enrolled in a
 program that grants the <u>Ph.D.</u> Applications may be for study in any sub-area or specialty in
 sociology.
- Applicants <u>must</u> be members of an underrepresented racial/ethnic minority group in the U.S. (e.g. Blacks/African-Americans, Hispanics/Latinos, Asians or Pacific Islanders, or American Indians/Alaska Natives).
- Applicants <u>must</u> also be U.S. citizens, non-citizen nationals of the U.S., or have been lawfully admitted to the U.S. for permanent residence.

WHAT IS THE PROCESS?

- Application deadline is <u>January 31st</u>; notifications are made by <u>April 30th</u>.
- Fellowship is awarded for <u>12 months</u> and may be renewable. Tuition and fees are arranged with the home department.
- Fellows are selected each year by the <u>MFP Advisory Panel</u>, a rotating, appointed group of senior scholars in sociology.
