WGS Travel Scholarship Awardees



Cassie Joy Sistoso is a scholar, advocate, and graduate student at Middle Tennessee State University whose research examines maternal mortality, reproductive health, and the structural inequities shaping medical outcomes. She holds a B.S. in Songwriting, a graduate certificate in Women's and Gender Studies, and will complete another graduate certificate in Applied Social Research and a Master of Arts in Sociology at MTSU. Alongside her academic work, she is deeply engaged in advocacy and volunteer efforts that expand access to reproductive health resources in Tennessee. As she prepares to enter the doctoral stage of her career, she remains committed to combining rigorous scholarship with transformative public impact.

Mary Holiman is a PhD student in Communication, Culture, and Media Studies at Howard University. I often say I was a feminist before I fully understood the term. My research trajectory reflects this—grounded in Black feminist thought and intersectionality since my undergraduate work on adverse childhood experiences and delinquency among Black girls. Over time, I've embraced the ways my personal passions shape my scholarship. Whether reflecting on cultural artifacts—from Beyoncé's *Church Girl* to the Southern Gothic horror film, *Sinners*—or analyzing embodied practices like pole dancing, I approach research with a commitment to honoring Black women's creative and resistant traditions. Last year, I launched a project titled *The Witches You Couldn't Kill Were Black: This Magic Is Resistance*, exploring African traditional religions and their role in resisting systemic



oppression. More recently, I've expanded my work into studies of gaming as imaginative play for Black women. I believe scholarship should be rigorous yet joyful, and I aim to model an academic brand that is both accessible and transformative.
